The Corps has just come through the period of reconstruction which is inevitably associated with the beginning of a new School Year. We are pleased to be able to congratulate our Senior Members on the examination successes with which they terminated their schools careers. It is evident that they brought to bear on their studies the same steadfastness of purpose and spirit of enthusiasm which characterised their work in the Corps.

The Lampard Cup Competition was strenuously fought out during the Summer Months, victory ultimately resting with Section I. (Sergt. H. V. George), Section II. (Sergt. Meek), being only one point behind.

Capt. Burton very kindly consented to judge the various competitions, and the Corps is greatly indebted to him for many helpful suggestions which have resulted in a considerable smartening-up of the Company Drill.

This year the Corps entered for the Lucas-Tooth Competition and was placed second among the School Corps in Devon.

Sergt. Major Burton was successful at the War Office examination for Certificate A—a success which was hailed with delight by all Members of the Corps. During his period of service, Sergt. Major Burton laboured unceasingly to maintain a high standard of efficiency in the Corps, and many Cadets will gratefully remember the odd minutes of special instruction, so willingly and painstakingly given them by their C.S.M. during their 'recruit' days.

As was expected the Camp proved very popular. The Corps went into Camp with a record strength of 61. The weather was not as good as we could have wished, but the Camp was an exceedingly happy one, and we are all exceedingly appreciative of the efforts made by our Commandant, Colonel Graham, to secure our well-being under somewhat adverse conditions. A full account of the Camp appears elsewhere, but mention must be made of the achievement of Cadet R. Pearce, who followed up his sports successes of last year by winning the Junior Championship on this occasion.

Shooting has continued to figure largely in our activities and the greatly increased Membership of the Corps has made heavy demands on the time of our Musketry Officer, Lieut. Armor. However the high standard of previous years has been maintained and at a Shooting Competition held at Camp, the Shield presented by Colonel Graham and Dr. Bush, was won by a team from Devonport High School Corps.




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## DEVON SECONDARY SCHOOLS CADET CAMP.

After the great success of the 1926 camp, it was expected that a large number of cadets would attend in 1927. When it became known, however, that not only had the same site been secured, but that Colonel Graham had once more consented to act as Camp Commandant, expectations were more than realised, and almost every cadet entered his name for the week under canvas.

The labours of the Advance Parties from the various schools were completed several hours before the main body arrived, and all was ready for occupation when the blare of a bugle band announced the arrival of the Crediton contingent. Devonport soon followed under Lieutenant Armor, and having passed the red-armletted military policeman at the entrance to the camp, we felt that we were quite ready to accomplish anything in the military line that might be required of us.

Tents had been allotted previously, and little time was lost before we were seriously engaged in "getting outside" a hot meal. An individual inspection by the Medical Officer followed, blankets and groundsheets were quickly issued, and for the rest of the day we were free. Bathing parades, although voluntary, were attended by almost every cadet in the camp, and soon afterwards cricket, soccer, and rugger were in full swing. "Last Post" came all too soon, and "Lights out" followed after an incredibly short fifteen minutes. The Atlantic Fleet was giving a searchlight display in Torbay during the evening but, unfortunately the Regimental Sergeant-Major didn't see eye-to-eye with us in our desire to watch the display from outside our tents. A slight diversion was caused during the night by the belated hunt for blankets and kit-bags made by two members of another school. Unwilling to sleep on the cold, hard ground, and anxious to find their kits they prosecuted a lively search in the dark and at length, a hoot of delight from one, and a heartfelt cry of "Oh! the little darlings" from another announced that the missing kit had been found. From then silence predominated.

Long before reveille on Sunday morning old campers were awakened by the agitated cries of those who on this, the first morning of their first camp were already attired in full uniform, including swagger cane, and in some cases water-bottle, and haversack, under the firm conviction that they were at least an hour late for parade. They refused to be comforted until the public appearance of a semi-conscious, pyjama-clad Devonport sergeant somewhat calmed their troubled minds.

Sunday was, of course an easy day. Line inspection, church parade, and bathing parade were—apart from meals—our only official appearances, but on Monday the training commenced in earnest.

The first day was spent in preparing for the General's inspection. Physical training commenced the day, followed after breakfast by a brief but very intensive instruction in arm drill by the Regimental Sergeant Major, and for the remainder of the forenoon we learned how to march past as a battalion under the direction of the C.O. This preparation had its fruit in the excellent display given by all companies on the day of the inspection.

Field training, however, was more general, and certainly more popular than mere drill. As the D.H.S. Corps had done a good deal of open order drill, we took a leading part in these tactical schemes. On one occasion, as the first wave of an attack, we assaulted, took, and consolidated our position without a hitch, and supplied heavy covering fire for the advance of other companies. On another occasion when a more difficult attack was being carried out against a railway cutting held by the R.E.'s we supported the first wave of the attack (Crediton) which was repulsed by a counter-attack-re-took, and consolidated the position, and finally took part in the assault which resulted in the capture of the cutting.

Weather only curtailed our programme of training on one occasion when, instead of the field day which had been arranged, lectures were given by various officers on subjects of military interest, one by the C.O., on one of the battles of Arras, being especially interesting.

Our afternoons, and evenings were free. The neighbouring towns of Brixham and Paignton attracted many, others preferred bathing, cricket, footer, shooting, or others of the numerous attractions offered by the camp itself. High spirits, and good humour were evident everywhere. Tossing in a blanket provided a good outlet for surplus energy until one unfortunate fell through his blanket, when the sport was stopped: it was soon replaced, however, by tossing in two blankets.

The festivities of the last night were as hilarious as usual. Various exciting diversions, including a turf-fight, and a procession of blanket-clad warriors, raised our spirits in preparation for the sing-song which Lieut. Davis had arranged. This was a huge success. Between the various solo items (one by Cadet Rooke comes vividly to one's mind) we sang or rather howled popular songs, and when our repertoire ran dry the bands were called in, and split the silence of the night with a variety of well known ditties.

Thus ended one of the best of our annual camps. The thanks of all D.H.S. Cadets are due to Lieut. Armor for his able supervision during the enforced absence of Capt. Ferraro, to the latter for his services after he arrived, to Lieut. Davis, whose efforts in connection with the sing-song have already been mentioned, and to the Head for his cake, as huge, delicious, and envy-provoking as usual.

It is pleasing to record that the D.H.S. Shooting Team were successful in winning the shield presented by Col. Graham and Dr. Bush, to be competed for annually, and that Cadet Pearce succeeded in winning the Junior Championship in the Athletic Sports.

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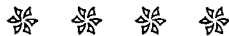
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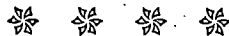
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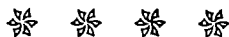

The new forms contain some clever footballers, of whom we shall hear more later.

### Rugby.

An experiment has been made in running a Rugger XV. from among the non-Soccer players. It is young in years and experience, and rather on the light side. The average weight is under 8 stone, and the average age is under 15. It shows distinct promise. Colley is Captain, L. Taylor, vice-captain, and these with Plucknett (Secretary), Stone and Oliver form a committee.

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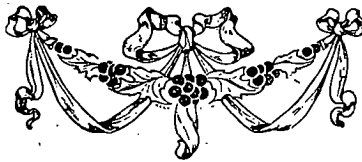

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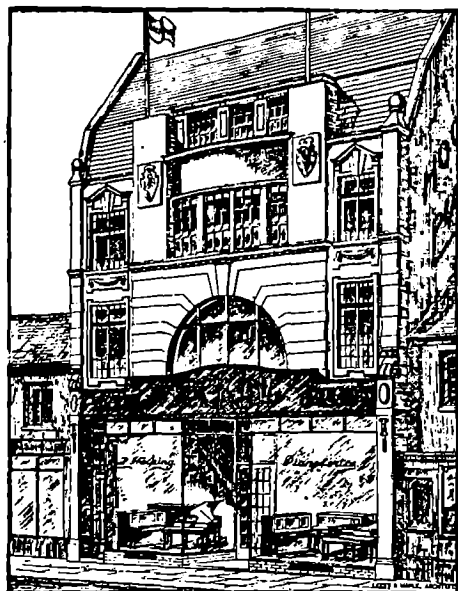
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
